PROFILE: MARY MARK OCKERBLOOM

Mary Mark Ockerbloom is the Wikipedian in Residence at the **Science History Institute**—a job so rare, Ockerbloom can list her counterparts nationwide. Her responsibilities include identifying images from the institute's collections and archives, and posting those images on the internet's foremost living encyclopedia. She also researches. Her recent look into the history of rare earth metals uncovered stories of scientists escaping Nazi Germany and Austria. Her work is a public service too. She instructs both major organizations and individuals on the processes and pitfalls of posting to Wikipedia. She even hosts monthly Wiki salons, where the public can learn more about the Wiki-verse. Next one: July 13 at noon.

And, as a bonus, it's vegan and sweetened with agave syrup instead of sugar.

- Now, Universal SphereTM: Every 15 minutes, Monday through Friday, 10 a.m.-5 p.m., Comcast Technology Center's giant orb lets 25 ticket holders view an all-encompassing, virtually realistic six-minute journey through human time and achievements, as executive directed by Steven Spielberg. Tickets encouraged.
- June 30-September 15, *I Do Not Know What It Is I Am Like: The Art of Bill Viola:* The Barnes Foundation premieres its first exhibition devoted to video art—and the world's first large-scale survey of works by American artist Bill Viola.
